"How can cities work with digital start-ups and digitalization?" BDF & UBC

Organised by Baltic Development Forum (BDF) and Union of Baltic Cities (UBC) as part of the UBC General Conference 24-27 Oct, Växjö, Sweden.

Wednesday, 25 Oct 2017, 09:30-12:30

The workshop will introduce and discuss cases on how medium sized cities in the Baltic Sea Region (BSR) can connect, thereby helping their digital start-up communities to connect and grow, promoting an integrated digital labor market. The aim is to inspire cities in their work with start-up communities, business development agencies etc. and inspire new city-to-city collaborations across borders. Other cases will suggest how cities can work with digitalization, for example to empower development and change in order to keep and increase service.

Connecting cities and digital start-ups

The BSR is a digital frontrunner. The countries are among the globally most advanced when it comes to digital competences, use of internet, e-government etc. And BSR cities display thriving digital start-up environments, based on talents/entrepreneurs, high innovation scores and creative ecosystems. Cities are the connecting dots of the digital market and startups provide the igniting spark to digital growth in many sectors.

However, there is more potential to be released. Startups founded, the amount of venture capital, business angel networks, international exit (especially unicorns) are very different across countries and cities in the BSR. There are complementarities to explore and utilize. But the urban startup scenes lie far apart and are separated by national borders. We would like to explore how cities can help start-up environments and local ecosystems to connect, especially outside the capital cities.

The State of the Digital Region 2016 from think tank <u>Top of Digital Europe</u> promotes city-to-city partnerships to support the interplay between digitisation, new technologies and cities http://topofdigital.eu/wp-content/uploads/2016/11/2016 StateOfDigital.pdf

Inspired by this, a small pilot project "Connecting digital start-up ecosystems in Nordic cities" has explored how interaction between three medium sized cities (Turku, Gothenburg and Aarhus) could inspire such partnerships to develop. There seems to be interest and potential for medium sized cities to connect, thereby connecting their start-up ecosystems. How to work with digitalization in the city development

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Baltic Sea cities as leaders of comprehensive cooperation between the EU and the Black Sea region. WiseEuropa Institute

One of the most promising developments in Europe after the end of the Cold War was the reinvigoration of cooperation between the cities located on the Black and the Baltic Seas' coasts within the framework of emerging formulas of "twin towns" and "partnerships". In fact, the Baltic Sea cities succeeded in establishing one of the most developed regional cooperation in the world. However, when compared to the Baltic Sea, the level of regional cooperation amongst the Black Sea cities is well below its potential due to a high level of geopolitical divisions of the region. For instance, the Black Sea cities have not managed to establish the Union of Black Sea cities.

The cities from the Black Sea region (excluding Greece in the Mediterranean Sea area that is a part of the Black Sea initiatives) established a relatively comprehensive network of ties with the cities of the Baltic region. In consequence, the level of cooperation between the Black Sea cities and their Baltic partners which has been already achieved creates a very timely "window of opportunity" for the Baltic cities to engage and to contribute towards a qualitative enhancement of regional ties in the Black Sea region through the transfer of know-how and the best practices. What is even more important, the increase of economic and social cooperation between the Black Sea and Baltic cities will also definitely strengthen the Black Sea region's ties with the European Union. Indeed, such a scenario would be beneficial not only for both regions but for the entire continent.

Nevertheless, a second great leap in the cooperation between the Black Sea and Baltic cities requires its social entrenchment through the rise of awareness among societies from both regions about mutual benefits stemming from it, rediscovery of common forgotten cultural and historical heritage and the reinforcement of people to people contacts (tourism, student exchanges, scholarships, internships, etc.), especially between young generations.

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Urbanization, Mobilities and Immigration as a driver of urbanization in the Baltic Sea Cities. URMI project.

Insights on urbanisation and immigration
